
PASSPORTS

The Majesty of Lakeland





Stop for coffee in Faversham the picturesque market town that is just waiting to be discovered. Time to enjoy the market and old-fashioned shopping centre before driving across Kent. to spend the rest of the day at Dover Castle. Commanding the gateway to England for nine centuries it has been at the heart of some of the most significant events in English History. Today we are able to see King Henry II's great Tower and private chambers and after immersing ourselves in the life of the 12th century Court we can enjoy the unique experience of the wartime tunnels telling the story of the miracle of Dunkirk and many other wartime exploits. There are ample catering facilities for lunch and tea before arriving home by approximately 7.00pm. (Note that because of steep slopes within the castle we are unable to take wheelchairs on this tour).



Today we visit Salisbury, dominated by its magnificent Cathedral Spire, the tallest in England and home to the original copy of "Magna Carta". Salisbury is a small medieval city in the heart of the countryside, but it is also a city of the present with a vibrant modern culture boasting modern day pedestrianised shopping centres as well as the old charter market. In the afternoon we drive across the New Forest to reach Romsey for a tea break, whose ancient Abbey Church contains the grave of Lord Mountbatten. Home by approximately 7.30pm.



Oxford or Bicester Shopping Village

The opportunity to either spend the day in Oxford or stay on the coach and do some shopping at the Bicester Outlet Shopping Village. Oxford is the University City renowned for its ancient colleges, riverside walks, museums and the refurbished Oxford Castle. This includes a market, restaurants and Visitor Centre that explains how the buildings of the former gaol have born witness to 1,000 years of history. Depart Portsmouth at 5.00pm. Home by approximately 8.00pm.



If you prefer the seaside then Southsea has all the ingredients for a super day out – miles of sandy beaches, a wealth of amusements including a large funfair, superb promenade offering views of the Isle of Wight and various sights like the original D-day Museum. BOOKING CONFIRMATIONS

When booking day tours or holidays the seat(s) will be held on option awaiting payment for up to 2 (TWO) working days from the day of booking after which the booking will be cancelled.

Day tour bookings will not be transferred to future tour(s) within 14 days of the departure of the original booked tour.

All bookings need to be paid in full 14 days in advance. Any booking made less than 14 days prior to departure will need to be paid at time of booking.

ADMISSION FEES

Are usually included in the Tour fare. The only main exception to this concerns visits to properties in the care of the National Trust. Passengers who are members of the National Trust are therefore advised to bring their membership cards with them.

CHILDREN'S FARES

Children under the age of 13 inclusive are generally charged two thirds of the adult fare to the nearest £1.00. All children need a seat, no sitting on laps.

DEPARTURE TIMES
